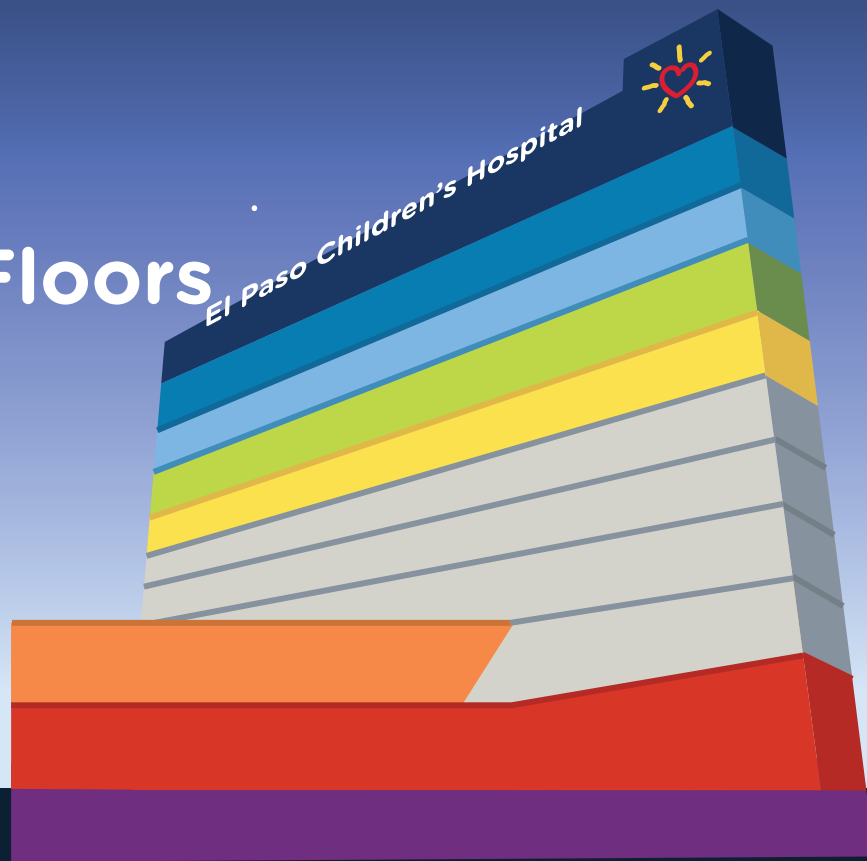

EL PASO CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL (EPCH) STRIVES TO IMPROVE THE LIVES AND OUTCOMES FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES NEEDING HEALTHCARE AND TREATMENT. To accomplish this, EPCH collaborates with several non-profit agencies, local community groups, and children's charities each year. Our relationship with these entities is an important part of improving health outcomes for children across our region by supporting education, advocacy, and promotion of partner events and initiatives.

In 2020 alone, EPCH provided close to \$25,000 in sponsorships and countless hours of community service by hospital staff to bring awareness to a multitude of health topics affecting children in the region. Some of these events



were held virtually due to the pandemic. In 2020 EPCH supported the Ronald McDonald House, community health fairs, March of Dimes, YMCA, Walk a Mile in Her Shoes, YWCA, Candlelighters of El Paso, Royal Run for Hope, KCOS Physician Show, El Paso Diabetes Association, and Lee & Beulah Moor Children's Home. In addition, we continued to develop virtual events to stay connected with our families and community. This year we held our fourth annual St. Baldrick's head shaving virtual event to bring awareness to childhood cancer. We also hosted our virtual NICU reunion.

INSPIRING A CULTURE OF EXCELLENCE IN NEUROSURGERY SUCCESS

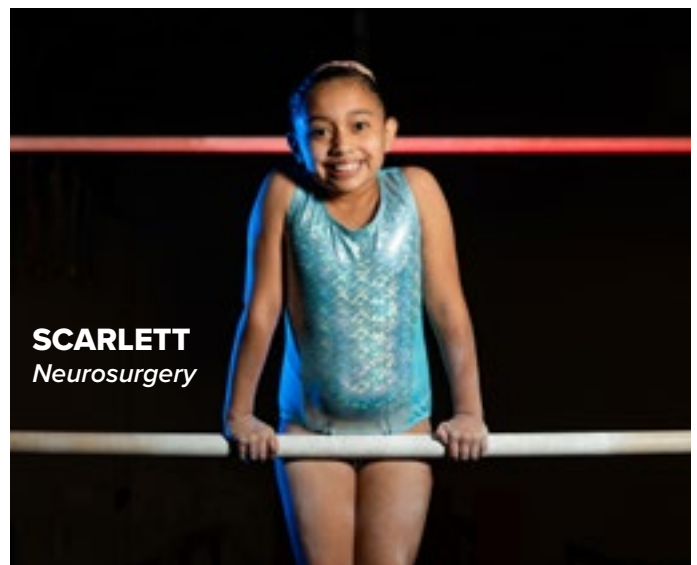

Cutting-edge technology, coupled with our specialized skill and training, ensure children receive exceptional neurosurgical care. Year after year, we have increased the total number of neurosurgical cases by 100%. This means that fewer patients leave El Paso and are able to receive world-renowned treatment close to home.

Cranial and Facial Clinic brings coordinated, multidisciplinary care to one location

SITTING AT THE EDGE OF WEST TEXAS, NEW MEXICO, AND MEXICO LIES A BEACON OF HOPE IN EL PASO, TEXAS - EL PASO CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL'S CRANIAL AND FACIAL SURGERY TEAM.

Located in the largest transnational city in the United States - EPCH is pioneering new frontiers and approaches to complex cranial and facial deformities, among them one of the most common is craniosynostosis. Craniosynostosis is the premature fusion of a child's skull, which restricts brain growth and may lead to severe cosmetic deformities, developmental delays, blindness, or even death.

The cranial and facial surgery team at El Paso Children's hospital is led by Dr. David Yates. This multidisciplinary team, nationally recognized and approved by the ACPA (American Cleft Palate-Craniofacial Association), consists of medical doctors, surgeons, nurses, physical therapists, case managers and more. All are dedicated to improving the lives of every single child that steps into the El Paso Children's Hospital. The cranial & facial clinic comprehensively treats complex cranial & facial deformities that range from common deformities like cleft lip and palate and craniosynostosis to rare syndromes like Parry Romberg, Pierre Robin, and craniofacial pathology. This multidisciplinary clinic allows all the experts from different specialties to simultaneously evaluate patients - eliminating the need to visit different locations/doctors' offices and truly provides convenient, comprehensive, and collaborative care. A child is the greatest gift a parent can ever receive. The staff and physicians see each patient as family. Being at the frontier of medical advancements allows El Paso Children's Hospital to continue to become the epicenter for the future treatment of children with cranial and facial deformities.

EQUIPMENT ADVANCEMENT FOR 2020

Over the past year, El Paso Children's Hospital (EPCH) was able to invest four million dollars in new equipment. The time is now to continue expanding complex pediatric care in West Texas. Our care must continue to meet the needs of our pediatric region. Some of the equipment that was purchased includes:

- *Additional equipment and instruments to accommodate complex neurosurgical cases and keep patients in El Paso.*
- *A new Orthoscan, which is a mini C-arm (imaging machine) that allows the surgeon to see bones in real time with the device emitting less radiation compared to the larger C-arm machines.*
- *New instruments and a navigation system for our Ear Nose and Throat (ENT) surgeons. This equipment allows the ENT surgeons to perform complex sinus surgery at EPCH. This is some of the best equipment available to pediatric ENT surgeons in the area.*
- *New cameras and laparoscopic instruments for general surgeons. We now use 4k technology to provide high definition that gives surgeons a better picture during laparoscopic surgery.*



- *Oral and Maxillofacial surgeons (OMFS) now use a Brumaba operating room table, which allows the surgeons to sit closer to the patients while working. OMFS surgeons now do more minimally invasive surgery using the navigation system allowing patients to return to normal activities sooner.*
- *Endoscopy has additional sterilization equipment. We also have additional scopes in various sizes to allow the pulmonologists to work on very tiny to adult-sized patients.*
- *New urology instruments to support Urologists in complex cases.*

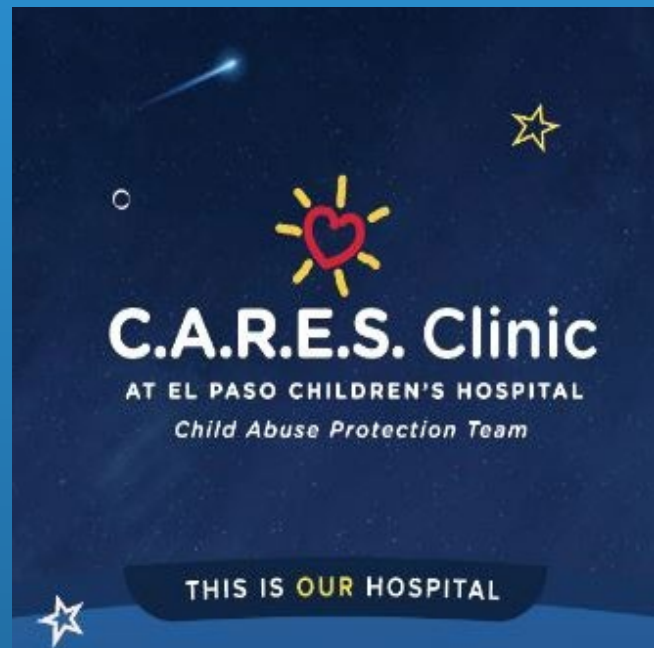
This equipment investment allows us to continue to provide the most advanced care to our pediatric population.

Expanding Space to Meet Patient Needs

In an effort to better serve the children of El Paso, Texas, and surrounding areas, the C.A.R.E.S. Clinic expanded to a new offsite location to provide a one-stop center to evaluate, treat and support victims of child abuse and neglect. Generous grants and donations received by the EPCH Foundation have allowed the Clinic's expansion to better serve the needs of the community in a larger space equipped with amenities that meet the highest standards for care. The C.A.R.E.S. Clinic has been in existence since 2012 through funding from the Texas Medical Child Abuse Resources and Education System (MEDCARES). The Clinic's treatment and services are developmentally, linguistically, and culturally appropriate designed with a child's needs, abilities and best interests in mind, intended to reduce the traumatic effects of child abuse and neglect.

In 2018, Texas Child Protective Services (CPS) reported 1,943 confirmed cases and 6,383 allegations of child abuse in El Paso County. In 2017, 172 children died from child abuse/neglect in the state of Texas, seven of which were from El Paso County. More children die from abuse in Texas than in any other state. This is a significant number for the El Paso community.

The C.A.R.E.S. Clinic collaborates with CPS, law enforcement, and local child abuse/advocacy stakeholders to provide comprehensive services to children who have been hurt physically and emotionally. This collaboration reduces the number of traumatic interventions for the child to help them and their family heal.



The C.A.R.E.S. Clinic services include:

- Comprehensive forensic medical evaluation and treatment of suspected child abuse, neglect and sexual assault in children under 18.
- Follow-up forensic medical examination and treatment for child victims of acute and chronic sexual and physical abuse.
- “3 in 30” Initiative, medical evaluation for children placed in foster care.
- Pediatric Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) services.
- Forensic examination with photo documentation.
- Testing for Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STDs) to include HIV.
- Social services and crisis intervention.
- Processing of application for crime victims compensation.
- CPS case reviews.
- Law enforcement case reviews.
- Court testimony.
- Period of Purple Crying training.
- Referrals for long-term counseling and any other medical services for child victims.

A Look Back at COVID-19

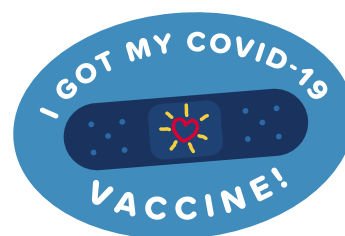

Finally, there was a light at the end of the tunnel in December 2020, when we were able to start the vaccination process for our team. We continue to push through this new dynamic in healthcare. As many have said, this is not a sprint or a marathon; this is a never-ending race to continue to find solutions and to be innovative as a team. Together we will finish this race and find hope during a time no one ever expected to have to live through.

IN 2020, WE CELEBRATED 13 PATIENTS, EACH ON THEIR OWN INDIVIDUAL JOURNEY, AND WATCHED THEM RING THEIR VICTORY BELL TO MARK THE END OF THEIR CANCER TREATMENT. As a Children's Oncology Group (COG) program, we provide the same treatment as big-name hospitals like Texas Children's Hospital, St. Jude's Children's Hospital, and many others. The year 2020 was a shock to so many, but our cancer patients had lived the quarantine life for years. As a cancer patient, these kids are considered to be immunocompromised, which means they are at a more severe risk of illness, even from a common cold. Cancer is a word that can have a never-ending ripple effect, but to say that these are some of our toughest patients is an understatement. 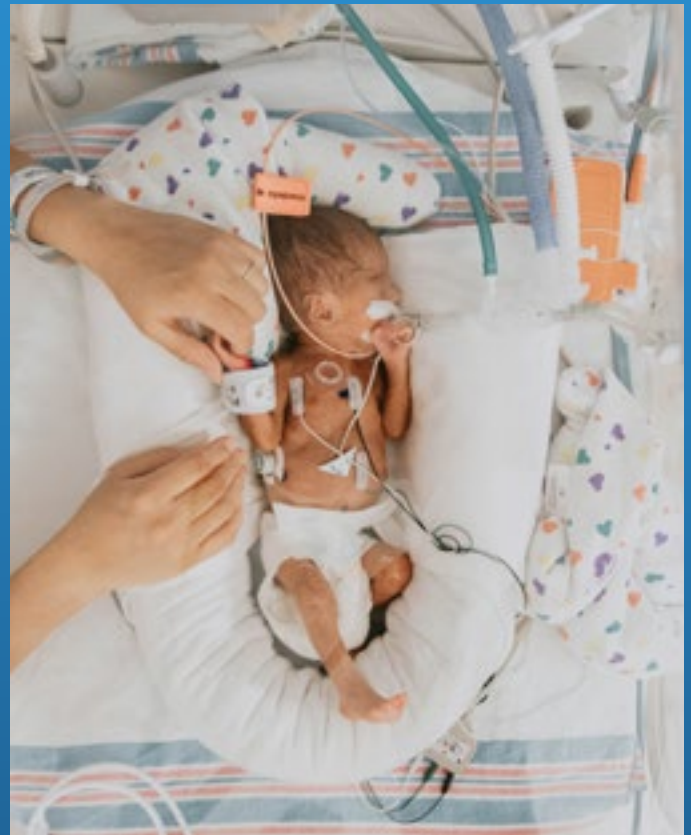


Fueling Innovation in Technology

Many can agree that the year 2020 was a lesson in the virtue of patience, as we were all tested with near-constant “Can you hear me now?” and “You’re on mute.” At EPCH, we know the importance of ensuring the best technology to care for our patients and to support our staff. From making iPads available to our patients and physicians, to setting up readily available Zoom accounts, to virtual visits and drive-by car parades, innovation was a part of every conversation.

However, it wasn’t just about being innovative, it was about remembering the importance of helping a child be a child. Our child life program played a huge part in making this an easy transition as they created unique patient interaction programs with virtual iPad communication, digital videos and virtual visits from characters.

In our LEVEL IV NICU, our parents benefited from our amazing NICVIEW cameras that allowed parents to share



a special link with family near and far to see the newest addition to the family.

For the safety of our patients, we purchased UVDI machines that allowed us to be more efficient in cleaning and disinfecting patient rooms in 5 minutes to increase turnover and ensure we provided the best care to our patients.

Being able to evolve is what allowed us to provide a safe, quality environment for our staff and physicians. Our diabetes team utilized our telehealth medicine that allowed them to provide lifesaving education to patients who need help in their journey with type 1 diabetes.

We are constantly improving our ways of communication and learning from other hospitals across the country and around the world as we move into the next chapter of technology and healthcare for pediatric patients.



The Power of Partnership

The story of health care in El Paso is a story of transformation throughout the decades. The power of partnerships help in building stronger strategic relations and alliances that empower the organizations to have a greater positive impact on the community.

In 1958, El Paso voters approved the creation of the El Paso County Hospital District and in 1961 construction was completed on the 300 bed Thomason Hospital tower. In 1999, the hospital district created El Paso Health which is a Texas-licensed Health Maintenance Organization (HMO) contracted with the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (THHSC). Then in 2007, voters approved bonds to construct an East Tower for the El Paso Children's Hospital. In 2009, Thomason Hospital changed the name of the hospital to University Medical Center of El Paso. The citizens created the El Paso County Hospital District (d/b/a University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC)) to ensure that quality healthcare services would be available to all county residents.

The hospital district includes University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC), El Paso Health, El Paso Children's Hospital (EPCH), UMC Foundation and EPCH Foundation. UMC is also the primary teaching institution for Texas Tech Health Science Center El Paso (TTUHSC). UMC is the only Level 1 Trauma Center and the only Comprehensive Stroke Center certified by The Joint Commission within a 270-mile radius. UMC is a safety net hospital providing medical care to all El Paso County residents regardless of their ability to pay.

El Paso Children's Hospital (EPCH) is one of only 250 hospitals across the country that specialize in pediatrics and one of eight members of the Children's Hospital Association of Texas (CHAT), and provides the highest level of pediatric care in West Texas. EPCH is a not-for-profit corporation whose purpose is to provide pediatric care services to the pediatric residents of El Paso and the surrounding region. El Paso Children's Hospital is the only separately licensed freestanding not-for-profit Children's Hospital providing exclusive pediatric health care. The relationship with TTUHSC – El Paso and community physicians, ensures that patients at El Paso Children's Hospital have access to the latest treatment methods and diagnostic service available from leading physicians in the field of pediatrics. El Paso Children's Hospital also maintains an affiliation with University Medical Center. This relationship allows our patients' access to the only Level 1 Trauma Center in a 350-mile radius of the hospital district, collaboration with maternal services and a wide range of access to other resources available to the hospital district.

Through these networks and our affiliated pediatricians, our hospital is impacting the health of more children than ever. Together we are coordinating care to create better experiences for patients and families as we work to create an epicenter of care for our pediatric population.





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
